At the Kite Primary Federation, we believe that reading is at the heart and centre of children's learning across the curriculum. The more children read, the greater their language development and the greater their access to the curriculum. We also believe that through reading a range of high-quality texts children's imaginations will be sparked and knowledge base of the world in which we live will be developed.

In developing our reading spine, teachers selected a wide range of texts to include poetry, picture books, books which celebrate diversity as well as books that they just love themselves!

One of the benefits of mixed year classes is children's exposure to texts from the year above and the year below, further increasing their love of a range of literature. When you visit your child's classroom, you will see these texts taking pride of place in the 'class library'.

We are currently in the process of developing our reading spine. Some year groups will add completely new texts for the academic year 2024 - 2025.

If you have any of these texts at home; do read them to and with your child and enjoy the pleasure that these texts bring.
